

### Annual Fall Dinner Meeting



The Rush County Historical Society had their fall dinner meeting on November 14, at the First Baptist Church in Rushville. Besides enjoying a tasty Thanksgiving style meal, members were treated to "Voices from the Past." This program organized by Carol Holzback

and Marianne Scott brought to life some key figures in Rush County history.

Carmelita Geraghty (portrayed by Marianne Scott) showed up to talk about her career in silent movies. She even gave the membership some acting tips. Despite her best

efforts, no new talent was discovered.

Next was Raymond Gibson (Bob Bridges), 4 term mayor of Rushville. Some colorful political times were revisited. Then Edith Willkie (Lou Starkey) stopped by. She explained that she went to school in Rushville and her roots here are why Wendell Willkie chose Rushville as his campaign headquarters.



Not only can Rush County claim famous individuals, famous animals came from here. The "smartest cow," Toots (Barb Drake) made an appearance. Hailing from Noble Township, Toots could pump her own water. She traveled as far as Chicago entertaining crowds and was named the "Smartest Cow in the Nation."

Our final guest was Knowles Shaw (Brad Berkemeier). His

family moved to Rushville from Ohio when Knowles was just weeks old. Brother Shaw played the violin and was known as the singing evangelist. He is probably best known for the lyrics of "Bringing in the Sheaves" which he wrote in 1874.



## Quilts of Valor

Quilts of Valor Foundation is a national organization whose mission is to cover service members and veterans touched by war with comforting and healing Quilts of Valor. The Foundation was founded in 2003 by Blue Star mom Katherine Roberts when her son was deployed to Iraq. Katherine felt she lived 10 seconds away from panic every day. Katherine had a dream about a quilt comforting a troubled soldier and from there QOVF was born with the message, quilts=healing.



There are many QOVF groups across the country and in January 2024 the Rushville Quilts of Valor Group was formed. Rush County Historical Society members Sharon Creager, Becky Webb, Priscilla Winkler, Libby Smith and Marty Connerly are among the Rushville Quilts of Valor Group founding members. Patty Caudill is the Rushville Quilts of Valor group leader.

Quilts of Valor quilts are donated through individual volunteers and quilt guilds. The quilts are not purchased and the Quilts of Valor Foundation provides guidelines in making the quilts. A Quilt of Valor quilt is a quality made quilt, hand stitched or machine quilted. Veterans are nominated to receive the quilts and the quilts are bestowed to the veteran or activeduty service member. The quilt unequivocally says, "Thank you for your service, sacrifice and valor in serving our nation."

Active Rush County Historical Society members who have received Quilts of Valor include Bob Bridges, Charlie Fields, Steve Mahan and Jeff Houser.



Locally, some of the quilts have been provided to Rushville Quilts of Valor Group by the Heart and Hand Guild. Heart and Hand Guild was established in 1991 with current active members from Rush County, Indianapolis, Brookville, and Ohio. Rush County Historical Society member Sharon Creager is active in this guild.

Although they don't keep an official count, Heart and Hand Guild has proudly donated at least 15 quilts to Quilts of Valor.



In addition to Quilts of Valor, Heart and Hand Guild donates to Rush Memorial Hospital and Rushville Chapter DAR.

Lap quilts, totes and other handmade items were donated to the hospital. Five quilts were donated to Rushville Chapter DAR for the Chemawa Indian School in Salem, Oregon.

# Things Done and Things To Do

Over the last couple years significant repairs have been made at the museum. Termite damaged beams under the sagging first floor were replaced and reinforced. The 2<sup>nd</sup> floor porch railing was replaced and the roof in that area repaired. Basement windows were sealed. The furnace was repaired. The flagpole was replaced.



Just like your own home and out buildings, Gowdy house and the carriage house constantly need repairs. It is often more costly to perform maintenance in order to keep the historical integrity. Memberships help cover monthly operating costs such as utilities, security and office supplies. However, dues do not accumulate to levels required to fund restoration and major repairs.


For large projects, donations, volunteers, grants and corporate

Other things deemed less critical yet need to be done are roof repair of loom room, peeling paint on Gowdy house and gutter covers.

In addition to maintaining our historic structures, valuable and rare items would benefit from restoration. For example, the RCHS owns a rare Penny-farthing bicycle in desperate need of attention.
